Britain promises Arab independence for WWI revolt.

Based on promise of self-determination, Arabs revolt against Ottomans; lose 20,000 lives

Jews are promised a homeland in Palestine after locals were promised independence

1917 Balfour Declaration

Britain promises
Jews a homeland
in Palestine

-Chance for escape from ongoing persecution -Potential self-determination

United States Role during this period:

-Instrumental in supporting the Balfour Declaration/Mandate at the Versailles Conference in 1919

-President Wilson organized King Crane Commission which found population of Palestine wanted complete independence under a provisional Arab government; findings ignored

Arab requests for self-rule are dismissed



1920 San Remo Conference

Allied powers assign mandates including language of Balfour Declaration

League of Nations assigns Britain as tutelary Great Power over Palestine



1936-1939 Great Arab Revolt

Strike evolves into armed rebellion against British rule and Jewish immigration

-Jews
allowed to
keep arms
-Form Irgun
and Haganah
militias

1939-1945 Holocaust

Jews are massacred by the Germans in WWII

United States Role during this period:

1938 Evian: US and 32 countries refuse Jewish refugees
